### Pam Blackledge on The Legacy of the Oceans

After growing up in northern Iowa and attaining her BS in Fisheries and Wildlife Biology from Iowa State University in 1995, Pam moved to Washington DC to begin working for a non-profit environmental organization – focusing on gathering the skills necessary to become an effective environmental organizer. She is now working to save our oceans. Oceans have provided people a seemingly inexhaustible bounty for millennia. This changed, however, during the last half century, marking a sharp environmental decline. Today, many more species, considered threatened or nearly so, are drifting toward extinction. Learn what is being done and how each of us can make a difference.

### Vic Berardi, “Identifying Falcons and Accipiters in Flight”

Thursday, October 7th at 7 PM

At River Bend Nature Center, 3600 Green Bay Rd., Racine

Accipiters (Sharp-shinned Hawks, Cooper’s Hawks and Northern Goshawks) are probably the most difficult raptor groups to identify. Learn how to tell the difference. Falcons (American Kestrel, Merlin and Peregrine) will also be discussed at length.

Vic Berardi is a Board member of the Hawk Migration Association of North America (HMANA) and is currently the organization’s Treasurer. He is also the Central Continental Flyway Editor for Hawk Migration Studies which records and reports migration results throughout North America. Vic also organizes the hawkwatch at Illinois Beach State Park and personally observed migrating hawks over 230 hours last fall and over 150 this past spring. He has written numerous articles on hawk identification and gives talks throughout the Midwest on raptors.

**Nighthawk Migration is Underway!**

Monitors along the lakefront have seen the greatest numbers in late August and early September in recent years. Optimum wind condition is a bit from the west—so as to stack them up against the lake shoreline. Join us on Tuesday evenings, 8/31 and 9/7, Michigan Blvd and High St, Racine--7 PM.

**Bluebird Trail Volunteers**

We are looking for people who may want to volunteer to check on bluebird boxes once or twice a month in the summer. The club has trails in both Kenosha and Racine counties. **Federal Duck Stamp**

On July 1, a new Federal Duck Stamp became available at post offices, national wildlife refuges, some national retail chain stores, and various sporting-goods stores nationwide. The Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp, which is the Duck Stamp's official name, has been a magnificent success story in its 70-year history. Started in the mid-1930s, to address a major crisis in bird conservation and wetland habitat loss, the stamp has been used as a highly effective funding mechanism for our refuge system, having accrued over \$670 million and having been used to secure more than five million acres of valuable wetland habitat for the system. About \$25 million a year is currently collected through yearly stamp sales. Proceeds from the \$15 stamp go into the Migratory Bird Conservation Fund, used to purchase valuable wetlands for the National Wildlife Refuge System. (Indeed, about 98 percent of the revenue from the stamp goes through the Migratory Bird Conservation Fund to purchases these refuge wetlands.)
