

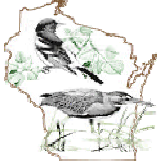

Noel will speak on the importance of the information that was gathered between 1995 and 2000 by 1,600 field observers who submitted more than 160,000 bird records. The Wisconsin Breeding Bird Atlas represents the largest natural history survey ever conducted in the state Wisconsin. Come hear about this new comprehensive guide to birds that nest in our state. Chimney Swifts and Common Nighthawks Counts

A few members of Hoy Audubon have been enjoying the sunsets and counting swifts and migrating nighthawks. They have located chimney swift roost sites in downtown Racine. Some area to look are the old Ala Rug Co, 500 6th Street (3 different chimneys); St. Patrick's Church on Erie St.; and the Water Department south of North Beach. You might see over a hundred at the Water Department chimney. This is our 5th year of monitoring the Swifts in downtown Racine. Perhaps some of you would like to participate in this endeavor in the next couple weeks. The count period is nightly for Night Hawks until mid September. Bird Interactions With Tall Structures and How To Reduce The Risk
Friday, October 13, 2006

Location: Ho-Chunk Conference Center
Wisconsin Dells / Baraboo, WI

Purpose:

- Create awareness and increase knowledge of the problems migratory birds face from tall structures such as buildings, broadcast communication towers, wind energy generators, and power lines
- Gain understanding of the restrictions on owners/operators of these structures
- Bring interested parties together to discuss the problems
- Open lines of communication and foster cooperation to help alleviate the problems

Who should attend: Industry representatives: building managers, owners; architects, broadcasting station owners, staff (engineers); wind energy equipment owners and operators; government decision makers and technical staff involved in regulating tall structures, environmentalists and bird lovers.

Upper Midwest Audubon Conference

Making Time For Birds And Nature
Saturday, October 14 and Sunday, October 15, 2006

Purpose: Strengthen Audubon Chapters in Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin to make a greater environmental impact and social presence in our communities through successful conservation and advocacy programs.

Who should attend: Audubon members, volunteers, leaders, and staff from Upper Midwest chapters, state councils, state offices and centers, and National Audubon Society. Bring your family, bring your friends!

Hosted by: Wisconsin Audubon Council, with collaborative funding from National Audubon Society and support from co-sponsors and their members. Co-sponsors: Audubon Council of Illinois, Audubon Minnesota, Bird Conservation Minnesota, and Iowa Audubon (invited).

Breakout topics at this date include chapter leadership strategies, blue-bird production, wildlife field trips for parents and children, statewide bird conservation initiatives, Important Bird Areas, birdscape to attract birds to your backyard, how to be an effective advocate for your issues, monitoring avian migrants in Milwaukee, and National Audubon campaigns focused on the Mississippi River and the Great Lakes.

Fees include scheduled meals, breaks and materials:

- \$40 "No Bird Left Behind" - Friday conference only
- \$20 Friday night hors d'oeuvres in lieu of dinner, with speaker Al Manville - Migration & Technology
- \$80 Upper Midwest Audubon Conference - Saturday and Sunday, including Saturday night dinner with speaker Jim Fitzpatrick - In Search of the Ivory-billed Woodpecker

Both conferences take place at Ho-Chunk Convention Center, Baraboo/Wisconsin Dells. Lodging rate (single or double) is \$65 per night, plus tax. Participants are responsible for reserving and paying for their own lodging. Camping opportunities are available nearby.

Other Upcoming State Events / Field Trips

The following events / field trips are not sponsored by Hoy Audubon Society but have been included here for those interested in attending.

Sunday, September 10, 2006 - Green Bay - Fall Warblers (WSO)

Meet: 8:00-8:30 am at Ken Euers Natural Area. Exit I-43 at Atkinson Dr. and go north to Hurlbut. Turn left on Hurlbut and go west to Military, and turn right to get to Ken Euers. Wear good walking shoes, because there will be some hiking, though leisurely. They'll probably tour by auto to Bay Beach Wildlife Sanctuary, Barkhausen County Park and possibly Sensiba Wildlife Management.

Saturday, September 23 - Sunday, September 24, 2006 - Superior - Wisconsin Point (WSO)

Meet: 7:00 am at the first beach parking area along the Moccasin Mike Road, the road that leads to Wisconsin Point. Weather plays such an integral part in birding this area, in fact the worse the weather the more incredible the birding could be. So prepare for the possibility of wet, cold weather as well as typical cool fall temperatures along lake Superior. Participants may want to bring old bread, popcorn, beef suet, etc. for "chumming" for gulls. If you are staying in a motel, make sure you book your reservation early!

Sunday, October 15, 2006 - Harrington Beach - Hawk Watch (WSO)

Meet: 8:00 - 8:30 am at the lower beach parking area of Harrington Beach State Park. Please note that there is a state park entrance fee. Bring a bag lunch or cooler.

Volunteer Help Needed for Prairie Restoration / Seed Collecting

Volunteers are once again assisting the DNR with collecting mesic prairie seed within the Kettle Moraine State Forest - Southern Unit. The seed collected will be used towards a 30 acre wet mesic prairie planting at Lulu Lake State Natural Area (northern Walworth County) in late fall. This is the second year towards restoring 90 acres of a former soybean field which will benefit grassland birds among other species. To add to the diversity of prairie species on this planting, many hands are needed each weekend! Seed collection dates will vary, but will primarily take place on weekends, now until mid-November.
