Our guest speaker, Jeff Bahls, was a member of 2007 Ivory-billed Woodpecker Search Team in Arkansas. Jeff will give a first hand account about his time spent in Arkansas in February 2007 as part of the Cornell University Lab Of Ornithology search for the woodpecker.

Jeff is a life long resident of Dodge County, Wisconsin. He has been an avid waterfowler for the past 35 years and is a member of the WSO, Ducks Unlimited, and is on the board of directors of the Wood Duck Society. Jeff has volunteered for various bird monitoring project including CBC's, Monitoring Wood Duck and Tree Swallow/Bluebird nest boxes, and has helped with baseline bird survey of Plum Island, part of Green Bay NWR. He volunteers for Horicon NWR and Horicon Marsh State Wildlife Area. Jeff is a 13 member of Horicon Marsh Bird Club and currently is the HMBC President.

He has always had a strong interest in birds of all species and much of his wildlife experience has involved birds such as Spotted Owls, Trumpeter Swans, Wood Storks, and Grassland songbirds.

Marty Johnson will discuss current woodland management strategies and potential efforts to monitor woodland bird species using these areas.

Listen to the peents and view the aerial dances of the twittering "Timberdoodle" at twilight.

Cliffside Park is located on the lakefront in northeast Racine Co., north 6 Mile Road, off of Michna Road. Meet by 7:00 P.M. at Picnic Area #2 (near the yellow gate). While there is daylight, we'll bird along the main trail north of the yellow gate for spring migrants.

The American Woodcock may begin to call around 7:30 P.M. or 8:00 P.M. (depending on if it is overcast or clear). Some of the trails may likely be wet from recent rainfall, so it is strongly advised to wear waterproof footwear. A warm jacket and gloves are suggested.

Highlights of the Hoy Audubon Field Trip to Bong Recreation Area for Winter Birding! by Jenny Wenzel

On January 31, 2009, Hoy Audubon hosted a field trip to Bong Recreation Area for the purpose of enjoying winter birds. The day turned out to be rather cold and windy, which kept many birds in hiding, but the event was a great success! Fourteen people gathered and enjoyed seeing a nice variety of birds, including 2 Northern Shrike, which turned out to be a life bird for many of us (thanks to Rick Fare for spotting them!). The Short-Eared owls that we had hoped to find had already left the area, but we spotted a nice variety of other birds, including an unusually tame Northern Bobwhite and a variety of birds at the Bong feeders. We were able to spot the difference between House and Purple finches, as well as sighting Downy woodpeckers, Goldfinches, Juncos, etc. and 2 American Tree Sparrows! The Rough-Legged Hawks didn't make an appearance, but we were happy to see a Red-tailed hawk perched in the trees! All in all, it was a great event and a wonderful opportunity to see birds and share our experience with others!
